

A three-member panel of the Board for Correction of Naval Records, sitting in executive session, considered your application on 18 August 2010. Your allegations of error and injustice were reviewed in accordance with administrative regulations and procedures applicable to the proceedings of this Board. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of your application, together with all material submitted in support thereof, your naval record, and applicable statutes, regulations, and policies.

After careful and conscientious consideration of the entire record, the Board found the evidence submitted was insufficient to establish the existence of probable material error or injustice.

You entered active duty in the Navy on 20 February 1986, and served without disciplinary incident until 6 January 1987, when you received nonjudicial punishment (NJP) for an unauthorized absence (UA). Shortly thereafter, you received the following disciplinary actions: on 28 May 1987, you received NJP for UA; on 30 December 1987, you received NJP for UA; and on 22 January 1988, you received NJP for three specifications of failure to go to your appointed place of duty. In addition, you self-admitted to a drug problem. On 26 February 1988, you were offered drug treatment, but you declined. You were recommended for separation with an other than honorable (OTH) discharge due to a pattern of misconduct. You waived your rights to consult with counsel, and request an administrative discharge board (ADB). The separation authority approved the recommendation and on 26 February 1988, you were separated with an OTH discharge and an RE-4 reenlistment

code.

The Board, in its review of your entire record and application, carefully weighed all potentially mitigating factors, such as your youth. Nevertheless, the Board concluded these factors were not sufficient to warrant recharacterization of your discharge because of the frequency of your misconduct. The Board found that you waived your procedural right to an ADB, your best opportunity for retention or a better characterization of service. Accordingly, your application has been denied. The names and votes of the members of the panel will be furnished upon request.

It is regretted that the circumstances of your case are such that favorable action cannot be taken. You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon submission of new and material evidence or other matter not previously considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity attaches to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
